There she was confirmed in the Evangelical Reformed church on May 1, 1851, by Rev. Keller. The same year the family moved to lowa, taking up their abode on a farm three miles southwest of Wheatland.

On May 19, 1871, she was married to John Keller, and fur fourteen years they made their home in Lowden. To them were born four children, three dying in infancy.

In the year 1885 they moved to Arcadia, Iowa, where they resided until the spring of 1890 when they came to Wheatland, where Mr. Keller conducted a blacksmith and wagon shop until his death on May 17, 1907, when Mrs. Keller gave up her residence here and went to make her home with her daughter, Mrs. E. J. Carroll, in Davenport. Sha is survived by her daughter and seven grandchildren, who all reside in Davenport except the eldest grandson Lawis, who is in France. She was also an aunt of Mrs. Fred A. Schneider, Henry J. Schneider. Of Massillon, besides a number of other relatives here with whom she enjoyed many pleasant visits during the past few years.

Mrs. Keller was a charter member of St. Paul's Reformed church of this place, and during her years of residence here took an active part in all church work. Her life was a long and moat useful one. Everyone who knew her loved her for her friendly manner and kindly ways, and the entire community missed her when she moved from our midst some years ago.

The funeral services were held here at St. Paul's Reformed church last Friday afternoon at 2:30, conducted by Rev. B. M. Fresenborg, while Miss Lydia Beckmann, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Thiele and Mr. Albert Wagner sang several appropriate hymns. Burlal was mads in the fsmlly lot in St. Paul's cemetery.
